E-Commerce and Information Systems

This course provides the undergraduate business major a basic understanding of business information systems and e-commerce. Topics include, but are not limited to, software business applications, systems architecture, e-commerce models, web design and usability, database management, wireless technologies, data communications, business systems development, project management, legal and ethical issues, and information security. Prerequisite: advanced standing in the Albers School. **5**
